- It is amazing to see what is written in the book of books by the author of our faith, Christ The Lord.
- Thomas proclaimed it to Jesus when he said, "*My Lord, My God*" when he touched the nail prints in his hands and felt the wounded side.
- So blessed are those who have not seen but believe, which is us.
- Our faith still leads to the cross and the power of the third day.
- "*After two days he will revive us; on the third day he will restore us, that we may live in his presence*" (Hosea 6:2, KJV)

The Blood of Jesus Speaks

- Faith searches for faith by its very nature, and the speaking blood calls out to our spirits within.
- We look at the glory of God from the beauty of Psalms 139 as the blood of Jesus speaks better tunings than that of Abel.
- Abel's blood calls out for retribution and justice, while that of Jesus calls out for reconciliation and forgiveness, and still speaks after 2000 years.
- "*For he shall have judgment without mercy, that hath shewed no mercy; and mercy rejoiceth against judgment*" (James 2:13, KJV).

The All-Knowing God

- All these aspects make up the divine nature of the Almighty God, as the telling of God's ever-present being, and as He is always aware of all matters in Psalms 139.
- For they are constantly testified to in scripture, and the psalm agrees together with what is written, as the psalmist declares that the Lord knows him, all that he plans to say before he says it.
- "*O Lord, thou hast searched me, and known me. Thou knowest my downsitting and mine uprising, thou understandest my thought afar off*" (Psalms 139:1-2, KJV).

- *"Thou compassest my path and my lying down, and art acquainted with all my ways"* (Psalms 139:3, KJV).
- *"Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I cannot attain unto it"* (Psalms 139:6, KJV).

God's Omnipresence

- Wherever it is that one would go, God will surely find you, for there are no barriers in Christ.
- In modern terms, if I board a spaceship to a distant galaxy, God would surely find me there.
- Psalms 139:7-10 reminds us that to take the wings of the morning is reminiscent of the sun breaking through the clouds in the morning time.

- *"Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea; Even there shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me"* (Psalms 139:7-10, KJV).

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
